Why Have We Come to Our Funeral?

Some years ago I asked the local funeral home to park their hearse in front of the Church one Sunday morning with the back door open. They then placed a casket in front of the Sanctuary. They opened it and then placed a mirror in it. When worshipers entered the Church the ushers asked them to go to the front to view the deceased. The Sermon was on John 11:25-26 by Pastor Don. The entire service had a powerful and positive impact on everyone.



Many years ago in the city of Jerusalem two wonderful Christian women, Mary and Martha, lost their brother in death. Lazarus had become sick. They sent word that Jesus should hurry and come and heal their brother. But Jesus delayed until Lazarus died and then appeared on the scene. It is then that Jesus said: "I am the Resurrection and the Life. The one who believes in Me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in Me will never die" (John 11:15-16).

Jesus just doesn't say that He is able to raise people or that He can give life, but that He is Life and Resurrection itself. He then went on to prove it. Even though Lazarus had been dead for four days the Bible says, "Jesus called in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, come out!'" Can you imagine the joy that family had?

And on this day, when we celebrate our own funeral, we have an atmosphere of joy and victory. Christian saint breathed his last breath of earthly air last Thursday. It was on that day, alone in his hospital room, that the angels of God paid their visit to this man. The angels always come when God's people are ready to go Home. That's one of their major functions. They came for Abraham. They came for Moses. They came for Lazarus. They came last Thursday for Christian.

Now, this is our funeral, and we've come. Yet, why have we come? I can think of at least three reasons.

- . 1. We've come to deal with reality!
- 2. We've come to see if there is victory!

3. We've come say to God: "Thank You!"

What is the reality? The Bible teaches us again and again that in the middle of life we are in death. The tensions that we have in life are a sign that we are going to die. The sufferings we go through are a process leading to death. The wrinkles on our faces, the slowness of our legs, the aches and pains – these are all things leading to death.

A Lesson in Humility

Humility, *humus*, is being close to the earth. It is being clear about ourselves so that we see when we're trying to control or manage or be in charge. It is learning to let go and have open hands. It is a freedom from the need to always get our own way or control a conversation. It is the freedom to say, *I don't know, but I'm willing to learn.* To me, that's one of its great values, because humility makes us teachable. And that's why it's really the most foundational of all the virtues and the most essential for spiritual formation and transformation. If we're not teachable, we don't move into character formation.

It was St. Augustine who emphasized humility as a key Christian virtue. That is because the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus redefined humility. But something is going on culturally, because it's been probably a century that we have not thought of humility even in a religious context. Narcissism, greed and egocentric stuff seem to be everywhere. I can find people and situations where folks have common courtesy and care for one another, but they feel like tiny specks of light on an ocean of darkness. Couple of Practical Ideas for Pastors (and others)

Idea # 1: Be Careful - about sharing private information about people with your elders and with your wife. Years ago I remember a fellow pastor who shared this info with his wife. She, in turn, passed it on to other ladies. When folks confide in you, it should remain confidential.



Idea # 2: Hymn Selection. For each service choose a variety of hymns. For the traditional service include one or two contemporary or "evangelical or Gospel hymns." For every contemporary service include one or two old favorites like "Abide With Me" or "Beautiful Savior." For a blended have a real blended service - a mixture of hymns. Have three or four hymns of paise to begin each service. Stay away from "draggy" music. Some organists or pianists play ever so slowly. This is not a dirge. Let's have joyful singing.

"But I Tell You..."

A sermon by Rev. John Larson preached in February at Ascension Lutheran Church, Littleton, Colorado. An excellent Law - Gospel message. Note how he uses the four words, "But I tell you...", over and over again.

Four words got Jesus into trouble. Did you know that? Just four words but He kept on using them over and over again. The four? "But I tell you..." In Matthew 5 He uses that phrase 6 times. "You have heard it said, 'Do not murder'. But I tell you, anyone who is angry with his brother will be subject to judgment." "You have heard it said, 'Do not commit adultery'. But I tell you that anyone who looks at a woman lustfully has already committed adultery with her in his heart." "You have heard it said, 'Love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I tell you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you."

When Jesus said those four words He got into trouble. He quotes Moses ("You have heard it said") and then says that He – Jesus – has a better word, a final word. "But I tell you..." Can you imagine the big shots in the church listening to Him say that? They questioned His right to say such things. They questioned His authority. [read more]

The people who attend your church are incredibly busy, but they make time for the things they care about. They show up to the things they think are important and value the most. When the long-anticipated movie comes out, their favorite band comes in concert, or it's their kid's birthday, people just don't miss.

One thing that's true every Sunday is that the people who didn't come to church that day are somewhere! They decided that something else was more important. Many good reasons are normal and natural such as family vacation, sickness, a destination wedding, and many others. That's part of life.



The point here is more about the "every-week" Sunday options, other than church, that present a greater benefit or value than attending church. The days are gone when pastors can merely say, "You should attend church." Or quote Hebrews 10:24-25 and expect people to come back next week.

The people who attend your church need to experience the benefit of attending your church. I don't mean that in a purely consumer frame of reference, although that's not a bad place to start. It's a good thing if people attend your church because they "get something out of it." **[read more]**

8 Characteristics of Churches That Embrace Evangelism By Chuck Lawless

Most churches in North America are not evangelistic. My role as Professor of Evangelism and Missions, though, allows me to learn about churches that are breaking this trend. Here are some characteristics of these churches:

- **1. They're led by pastors who are themselves evangelistic**. I've written before that I've never seen an evangelistic church not led by an evangelistic pastor. The passion of the leader grabs the attention of the congregation he leads.
- **2.** They believe and teach the exclusivity of the gospel (that is, Jesus is the only way, and no one can be saved apart from a personal relationship with Him). This truth compels them to teach the Good News through all they do.
- **3.** They emphasize the significance of baptism. It's not just a "tack on" at the end of a service; it's a central part of the church's worship and celebration. What Is Conversion?

A Children's Talk By Pastor Don Needed: one cup and a small pitcher of water In John 7:38 Jesus makes a promise. I'll say these words and then we'll all say them together. "Whoever believers in Me, (*let's say it out loud*), out of his heart (out of his heart) will flow rivers (*together*) of living water (*together*)." What is conversion? Let's look at this upside cup on my hand. Right now this cup has three lacks:

- 1. DARKNESS no light can get in
- 2. EMPTINESS There is nothing in it
- 3. USELESSNESS It is good for nothing as it is

This cup needs to be converted. It needs to be turned over. Cup, please turn over. This cup can't. The cup cannot convert itself. It needs someone to convert it or turn it over. Can we convert ourselves? NO! We need someone to convert us. That's what God does when we are baptized and believe in Jesus. Let convert or turn the cup over. There. Now see what it has.

- 1. LIGHT light has filled up the cup
- 2. FULLNESS let's fill the cup up with water
- 3. USEFULLNESS now I can take a drink from it.

Ummm - good. Do you believe in Jesus as your Savior? (Yes) Great! Now what does Jesus say? "When you believe in Me as your Savior, out of your heart will flow living water: Enough water for you and for you to give to your friends. Now let's bow our heads and pray. I'll say a few words and then you pray them after me.(ex corde prayer - you can flesh this talk out for more details depending on the age of the children)

When We Feel Forgotten

By Martin Luther (Faith Alone - 365 Devotional Readings)

Nevertheless, the chief cupbearer didn't remember Joseph. He forgot about Him.. Genesis 40:23

After being forgotten by the cupbearer, Joseph struggled with the temptation of becoming impatient and complaining. When the devil saw this, he attacked Joseph with even more fiery arrows. Christ Himself felt these arrows when the devil tempted Him: "If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become loaves of bread" (Matthew 43). In the same way, the devil might have said to Joseph, "Go ahead and continue your miserable struggle. You know that your prayers are useless. You cry to God and that God would free you and restore your honor because you interpreted the chief cupbearer's dream. Well, let God save you if he feels



like it." The devil continued to torment Joseph with his fiery arrows, even though Joseph was already weak and wounded.

When faithful people are happy and when they sing, "The Lord is my strength and song" (Psalm 118:14), the devil stays far away from them. All complaining and impatience soon end. As long as believers praise and thank God, then temptation, sadness, and unbelief disappear. Heaven is opened wide and hell is shut with words like these: "I will thank the Lord at all times. My mouth will always praise him" (Psalm 34:1).

But as soon as we stop praising God, miserable, lonely, sad thoughts return. That's what happened to Joseph when he remembered how his brothers had sold him. They were at home having a good time while he was lying in prison, tied up and miserable. This is how the devil works. When the water becomes troubled, he likes to fish. He uses these opportunities to tempt people to abandon their faith and give up in despair.

I once asked a lady in our Wednesday morning Bible study if she sinned. She said, "Yes." I said, "Tell us about some of

your sins." She said, "No!" We understand. But be sure you tell Jesus. He loves you and will forgive you. dfg
