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The Pastor's Preaching Is Key By Pastor Don Ginkel



A recent Barna study indicated that "The consistent practice among growing churches was well thought out and executed with people on their contact lists." Congregations that added a lot of new members tended to speak of a robust system to maintain connection with those who were prospects. After the initial connection was made, the congregation intentionally nurtured the relationship with the hope that eventually the contact would consider their congregation their spiritual home.

This process is critical. A congregation can be excellent at connecting to the community and even have a cultural outreach, but if they are not intentional about keeping track of these new friends and intent upon strengthening ties leading to discipleship, the congregation (and the Kingdom) will likely see little growth. Barna: "The second set of behaviors that was common to all exemplary churches revolved around very persistent follow-up with visitors. These churches were excited to see new people, and they made sure to let these people feel valued. They made sure to do this in a non-intrusive way that would not make their guests uncomfortable."

Barna: "These pastors talked and talked and talked about the importance of reaching their community for Christ. They talked about it from the pulpit and in smaller settings. They communicated unequivocally to their people an expectation to be reaching those outside the church, and they provided concrete steps to do so. These conversations, over time, established a missional culture within the congregation.

In a congregational survey, when lay members were asked what helped them be effective in outreach, the preaching of their pastor was often mentioned. The power of the pulpit should not surprise us. Just as critical was when they saw their pastor personally bring folks to Christ and the congregation. Important conclusion: The people will imitate their pastor.

Stack of Stuff

Pastor friend -

Sometimes only eternity will reveal the fruits of your ministry, perhaps hidden now, but they will come to light soon. Keep up your good work for Jesus and His people and for those who are not yet His people.

Genuine love

People want to know that their pastor loves and cares about them. They want to know that he has compassion for those who are hurting and patience for those who struggle. People want to know when a pastor genuinely loves them - they can feel it. And over time, actions reveal it.

Two tips

One: If you spend a lot of time on the road for hospital visits, redeem the time with audio books or podcasts.

Two: Some church staffs meet too often. Many meetings could be emails or a quick hallway conversation.

What if at the end of your sermon next Sunday, your congregation asked you: "So what?" - what would you tell them?

A big error some young leaders make is thinking leadership is about the leader. It's not about you. It's about serving others.

Idea # 1: Something everyone loves

Exercise for People Over 60

Begin by standing on a comfortable surface, where you have plenty of room at each side. With a 5-lb potato bag in each hand, extend your arms straight out from your sides and hold them there as long as you can. Try to reach a full minute and then relax. Each day you'll find that you can hold this position for just a bit longer. After a couple of weeks, move up to 10-lb potato bags and eventually try to get to where you can lift a 100-lb bag in each hand and hold your arms straight for more then a full minute (I'm at this level). After you feel confident at that level, put a potato in each bag.

Canine Comfort Ministry

When a May 2011 tornado wiped out portions of Joplin, Missouri, Immanuel Lutheran Church used comfort dogs to soothe traumatized community members. Also known as crisis response dogs, comfort dogs receive training to console people in a variety of settings, including schools, libraries, health-care facilities, disaster zones and mass shooting sites.


"We had never heard of comfort dogs before. [We] didn't really know what they were," recalls Jason Glaskey, youth and family minister at Immanuel Lutheran, which has an average weekend attendance of 200. "But we invited them in, and we saw how much of an effect they had on the people who were coming to our church's relief center after the tornado. People would stop and pet the comfort dogs who were there, and you could see the relief and the release in their emotional state."

By the end of summer 2011, the Immanuel Lutheran staff decided to start a full-time comfort dog ministry. With comfort dogs Louie and Jackson, the church not only helped community members recover from the tornado, but also visited public schools, nursing homes and hospitals with the animals. Today, their latest comfort dog, Daniel, is a young Golden Retriever.

"Our ministry is all 100% purebred Golden Retrievers, because they're a very calm breed," Debra Baran, communications director for Lutheran Church Charities, says, "They love to be petted, and they're very trainable. Our dogs, they just want to be there next to you." Daniel turned two in January and is named after Daniel 12:3: "Those who are wise will shine as bright as the sky, and those who lead many to righteousness will shine like the stars forever."

About a dozen people at the church manage Daniel. The dog also has two families that care for him when he's off duty. So far in his young career, Daniel has visited hospitals, nursing homes and schools. "We get to begin our work of visiting with people and sharing the mercy and compassion of Jesus with people who are suffering and in need," Glaskey says.

The Benefits of Suffering By Martin Luther (Faith Alone - 365 Devotional Readings)



Joseph prepared his chariot and went to meet his father Israel. As soon as he saw his father, he threw his arms around him and cried on his shoulder a long time. Genesis 46:29

Israel, or Jacob, didn't despair even though he faced many troubles. He appeared to be rejected, but God didn't abandon him. He remained God's child, but God didn't abandon him. He remained God's child, and God remained in him in a hidden and

wonderful way. Much later, when the events played themselves out, Jacob saw his son Joseph was still alive and become an important leader in Egypt. Then Jacob was happy to have gone through so much suffering. He thought, "I wouldn't have experienced this much happiness if my family had been taken care of the way I had planned. Joseph would've been just a shepherd like the rest of my sons. But now he has been elevated to a position of royalty, and he will save many people."

So, when we are being disciplined and feel sad, we shouldn't fight against our troubles, but rather remind ourselves, "I will not die, but I will live" (Psalm 118:17). Even when the opposite seems to be true, we should say, "Whenever I feel helpless, I can put my trust in God, who is able to make everything out of nothing. When I am totally devastated, no one can lift me up again the way He can."

The more severe the suffering, the greater the wonderful benefits to God's holy people. Being tested through suffering is a sure sign of God's kindness and mercy to His faithful people. When they faithfully cling to God's promises, unbelievable blessings result. James says, "Blessed are those who endure when they are tested. When they pass the test, they will receive the crown of life that God has promised to those who love Him" (James 1:12).

When Isaiah saw the Lord God seated on His throne in Chapter six, he was overcome with joy. Oh,what an infinite majesty was God's majesty. Oh, what a glory. Oh, what a throne. Oh, what a sight! Soon you will see what Isaish saw.
